ISSUE:

FINANCIAL UPDATE

#### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

The enclosed statements represent our financial performance for the first three quarters of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017. Total revenues earned after nine months equaled 74.37% of the budgeted amounts. The Outside Jurisdictions Per Diem Revenue ended March 8.74% below budget at 66.26%. We held an average of 84 outside inmates per day during March, as well as 953 local inmates. For March, the total number of inmates held was 1037, a net increase of 1 inmate from February. Our FY-17 budget is based upon 93 outside and 1107 local jurisdiction inmates, for a total of 1200. Our lower than expected ADP is reflected in revenues earned for State Per Diems and Inmate Housing Fees. Also, our higher employee turnover has resulted in lower Comp Board Salaries/Fringes revenue than budgeted for the first three quarters of FY-17.

Regarding our local jurisdictions per diems, for the month of March jail usage by Appomattox, Bedford and Halifax Counties exceeded the initial percentage that was used to prepare the FY-17 budget. Amherst and Campbell Counties as well as the City of Lynchburg experienced a surplus for March. Year-to-date figures reflect Appomattox, Bedford and Halifax Counties and the City of Lynchburg exceeding the initial percentage that was used to prepare the FY-17 budget. Amherst and Campbell Counties currently maintain a surplus fiscal year-to-date through March. Each month's financial report includes a percent comparison of usage days for each locality in relation to the total number of inmate days overall for that month as well as year-to-date. In January, 2018 we will re-distribute the per diem payments by issuing an invoice to any locality that utilized a larger percentage of bed space than initially expected, and checks or per diem credits to those localities underutilizing their allotted bed space.

The bottom of the Revenue Report contains F-Y-I information on the number of out-of-compliance inmates currently housed in our facilities. The records reflect a continual decrease in inmates between January and March.

Total expenditures for March equaled 69.64% of the budgeted amounts for the first nine months of the fiscal year, which is 4.73% below our earned revenues. All budget categories remain below the comparative average of 75% for the first three quarters of the fiscal year. In the Inmate Services category, the combined category lines finished March at 66.83% of the budgeted amounts. At 66.1% Inmate Food finished the month almost 9% below the comparative average for the first nine months of FY-17. A continued lower than expected ADP is reflected in this line item. Invoices were paid in March and an encumbrance remains open for replacement

Food Service Supplies & Equipment; however we have only expended 18.3% year-to-date of the amount budgeted in this line item. In addition we have only expended 68.1% of the amount budgeted for Inmate Medical through March. We have been very fortunate this fiscal year regarding medical costs; however as we have explained in the past, this line item category can fluctuate month-to-month and is difficult to predict. Invoices were paid during March for replacement Inmate Linens which resulted in 55% of this line item expended year-to-date. Invoices were also paid during March for replacement inmate jumpsuits and charged to Inmate Clothing. An encumbrance for work release drug tests was placed as well and charged to Inmate Programs, resulting in 36.5% spent year-to-date.

In the Administrative Operations category, at 62.51% these line items remain well below the comparative average for the first three quarters of the fiscal year. Invoices for the purchase of replacement clothing were charged to the Staff Uniforms line item. Invoices were also paid for a large order of toner and charged to Computer Supplies, and a large order of business cards and inmate forms resulted in 79% of the Printing line item expended through March. As reported in prior months, a high turnover of jail officers as well as replacement medical and maintenance staff factored in the increased costs of Advertising, Applicant Physicals/Drug Screens and Applicant Psychological Tests, which may possibly exceed the amount budgeted by year end. Invoices were paid for replacement IT parts and switches, as well as repairs to the BADC sidewalk, and charged to the Non-Capital IT Equipment line item (65.66% spent) and Non-Capital Improvement Projects (29.24% spent) respectively.

In the Contract Services and Leases category, total expenditures finished March under budget at 60.5% expended. During the month invoices were paid for support for security equipment as well as quarterly sprinkler inspections, which resulted in 61.81% expended in the Rentals/Leases/Service Agreements line item.

Finally, at 68.6% the Physical Plant/Vehicle Operations category in total finished nine months of the fiscal year 6.4% below the comparative average. All individual line items remained below the 75% comparison with the exception of Utilities: Gas and Utilities: Water & Sewer which were expended at 105.3% and 82.7% after three quarters of the year. Invoices were also paid for a BADC floor polisher, ACADC air handler coils, and BADC pressure washing and sliding door repairs. An encumbrance was placed for an ACADC transformer, and all were charged to Repairs & Maintenance Supplies and Services.

HONEYWELL PHASE II ESCO PROJECT

#### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

At the March Authority meeting the Board heard a presentation from Honeywell representatives concerning a proposed Phase 2 ESCO project. The presentation was in follow up to the project the BRRJA began in 2013 to design, install, and monitor a comprehensive energy-conservation program. The initial energy performance project which included the replacement of aging equipment and fixtures with more energy efficient models was completed in mid-2015 and resulted in substantial savings.

The Board directed the Administrator to work with Honeywell to gather additional information and provide a more detailed outline of a Phase 2 project. Mr. Trent will provide a summary of the meeting held with Honeywell on April 6, 2017.

UPDATE ON GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE PROVDIER

#### **BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION**

At the March Authority meeting, the Board approved an increase in the employee group health insurance line in the proposed FY17-18 Operating Budget. The increase was based on the rate estimate from the current provider (Anthem). In an effort to reduce costs to the Authority, the Administrator issued a Request for Proposals to qualified insurance carriers to provide comparable coverage.

Proposals were received from three providers in addition to Local Choice and presentations were held with Optima and Piedmont to compare coverage. It was determined the proposal from Optima offered the best rates. The Authority will save approximately \$268,696 by switching from Local Choice to Optima without raising the cost to employees. A summary is attached detailing the results.
