The people that live in our County and are attracted to life here have a foundation of strong values. These values include a strong work ethic, caring about other people, being good neighbors, and knowing right from wrong.

As a Board, we recognize that our County's success is dependent on our ability to look toward the future and skillfully manage change while attending to the needs of citizens in a responsible way. Our desired future includes the following:

Economic Development One Step Ahead

Our vision for the County's economic future is one step ahead of the economy. Recognizing that more and more people will seek the quality of life that Amherst County provides and that our population will grow, we have thoughtfully prepared for that future.
