I. Call to Order

At a regular meeting of the Amherst County Board of Supervisors held on March 2, 2021 at 3:00 p.m., the following members were present:

Chair Moore called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

II. Approval of Agenda

By motion of Supervisor Ayers and with the following vote, the Board approved the agenda.

III. Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Vice-Chair Pugh led the Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

IV. Citizen Comment

Ms. Kimberly Brinkley of Old Wright Shop Road, Madison Heights, Virginia addressed the Board and introduced herself as the representative of the Community of the ILLS, the silent citizens of Amherst County that have needs. She said there was a fear of intimidation from this Community and she was obligated to bring forward the "whispers" from her community. In September 2020 a charrette was scheduled to solicit ideas for the Central Virginia Training Center property. It was the consensus of the Community of the ILLS their voice was not heard nor addressed and the Community believed they were ignored and not represented.

Ms. Brinkley invited the Board meet with the Community of the ILLS members to discuss how to make their quality of life better.

V. Consent Agenda

By motion of Supervisor Tucker and with the following vote, the Board approved the Consent Agenda for March 2, 2021.

A. Minutes - February 2, 2021 (3PM) and Budget Workshop (5PM) It was moved that the Board adopt the minutes of February 2021 (3PM) and Budget Workshop (5PM).

B. Appropriation of Revenue - EDA Incentives

It was moved that the Board appropriate \$96,357 of Machinery and Tools Revenue to the EDA for incentives.

VI. Old Business

A. Budget Discussion

County Administrator Rodgers reported to the Board that other revenues and expenses have now been found. He advised one issue was a five-percent (5%) pay raise for Comp Board employees. If the Board accepts this increase, he said there would need to be a match of that same percentage for the other county-funded employees who work for the Constitutionals. He asked the Board how they would consider making that adjustment.

Finance Director Stacey Wilkes provided a handout showing the current budget cuts with explanations that the Board has agreed to. (See Attachment 1)

Ms. Wilkes explained the Comp Board approved a 5% pay raise for all of Constitutionals and their employees effective July 1. She advised the Board would need an additional \$16,000 to make up the deficit of the Comp Board's funding portion. She also reported that the Department of Social Services would receive a 5% pay raise from the State and Director Susan Mays would not be coming before the Board to ask for any funding.

Ms. Wilkes explained the attached worksheet that shows \$286,793 as the additional amount the County would need to fund a 5% pay raise for all employees including the Comp Board's portion. She advised \$42,000 had already been funded to provide the 1.5% COLA. (See Attachment 2).

The Board discussed several issues that included the 1.5% COLA which was based on the Consumer Price Index, and that the County continue to maintain competitive salaries with neighboring jurisdictions. The Board also discussed the ACSA Contribution for the sewer extension fund and a possible reduction of annual funding.

By motion of Supervisor Martin and with the following vote, the Board accepted the funding from Comp Board to do a 5% salary increase for the Constitutional Officers.

By motion of Supervisor Martin and with the following vote, the Board accepted the FY2022 budget cuts as presented but reduced the Service Authority annual contribution by \$25K to make up for a (approx.) \$16K shortfall.

Ms. Wilkes provided the Board with a Budget Calendar Update with a Board Workshop scheduled for March 30 to finalize the budget. (See Attachment 3)

VII. New Business

A. Appointment of Redistricting Committee

Community Development Director Jeremy Bryant presented information regarding the formation of a Redistricting Committee in response to the 10-year census related to locality redistricting. The committee would consist of one citizen from each electoral district, the Chair of the Board of Supervisors and a second member of the Board, the County Attorney, the Registrar, Director of Community Development and the IT Director.

Mr. Bryant asked Board members to appoint a citizen member from their district and provide him with the names of those citizens. He said when he receives additional information from the Census Bureau, he will provide that to the Board.

Mr. Rodgers requested that Board members each nominate a citizen by the end of March 2021.

By motion of Supervisor Martin and with the following vote, the Board adopted Resolution 2021-0004-R and recommended Mr. Kenneth Campbell as the District 1 representative for the Redistricting Committee.

NAY: None ABSENT: None B. Neighbors Helping Neighbors - Permit Fee Reimbursement Community Development Director Jeremy Bryant addressed the Board regarding a request by Neighbors Helping Neighbors to waive a \$500.00 plan review fee and a \$35.00 land disturbance permit fee.

During the discussion, Supervisor Martin commented that the Board typically does not waive fees as that money is placed in the general fund.

By motion of Vice-Chair Pugh and with the following vote, the Board denied the request for a \$535 reimbursement to Neighbors Helping Neighbors for the erosion and sediment control plan review fee and land disturbance permit fee.

VIII. County Administrator's Report

A. Boards/Commissions/Committees - Quarterly update
County Administrator Rodgers provided a quarterly update to the Board regarding upcoming
vacancies.

B. Earthworks Projects

County Administrator Rodgers reported on projects that he has asked Public Works to do inhouse as time permits.

- 1. Lynchburg Road trees have been cleared and working with VDOT to pave a section of roadway for patrons to have easy access to the new brewery in the Town.
- 2. Horseford Road asked Public Works to clear trees on that road and widen and level a foot trail for access to Riveredge Park from Madison Heights
- 3. Scentral Bark grading asked Public Works to work on the grading
- 4. Lake circumnavigation trails asked Public Works to cut a foot trail around County lakes
- 5. Jail loop trail the County owns 100 acres below the jail and would like a trail cut through that area
- 6. Parking lot expansion at Rose's Mill Public Works is working on expansion of the parking lot
- 7. Further trail clearing at Riveredge asked Public Works to get the next section of the trail ready

Supervisor Martin said to make sure that erosion and sediment control guidelines are followed.

Mr. Rodgers reported that the AG Complex stakeholders meeting has been moved to Amherst Middle School for March 10 at 5:00 p.m.

She advised the Joint Board Committee is looking for a member to sit on the Building Committee to discuss new construction projects for the school.

Supervisor Martin agreed to accept a seat on the School Division Building Committee.

By motion of Supervisor Tucker and with the following vote, the Board appointed Mr. Tom Martin to be its representative to the School Division Building Committee.
