

CASE MANAGEMENT

99% of Intellectual/Developmental Disability Case Management clients were discharged successfully.

96% of clients showed improvement at time of discharge from Mental Health Case Management Services.

INTENSIVE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

WOMEN'S RECOVERY RESIDENCE

A comprehensive, intensive addiction treatment program with an 8 bed capacity.

91% of clients served showed improvement at time of discharge.



MULTISYSTEMIC THERAPY (MST)

100% of youth with improved family relations.

95% of youth living at home and in school or working.

100% of youth with no new arrests.

OFFICE BASED ADDICTION TREATMENT (OBAT)

An intensive addiction treatment program recently expanded it's capacity by 50%, serving up to 60 clients at one time.

KEY CLINICAL INIATIVES IN AMHERST

HEALTH RESOURCES AND SERVICES ADMINISTRATION (HRSA) GRANT

OBJECTIVES

- \$800,000 provided through a Federal Health Grant to establish extended outreach and treatment in rural, Central Virginia.
- Utilization of Evidence Based Illness Management and Recovery (IMR) Treatment Model.
- Four-year grant slotted to serve 150 clients in Amherst and Bedford Counties to address rural health disparities in Central Virginia.
- Eligibility: individuals 18+ years, have a serious mental illness diagnosis and are a resident of Amherst or Bedford County.

OUTCOMES

- 30 grant partners trained in Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Illness Management and Recovery (IMR) Model.
- 68 individuals enrolled in program to date.
 - o Grant Cycle Year 1: 43 individuals.
 - o Grant Cycle Year 2 (in progress): 25 individuals.
- · 88% avoided psychiatric hospitalization.
- 82% increased coping skills.
- 54 of 68 are taking psychotropic medication as directed.
- 52 of 68 have improved social connectedness.

KEY CLINICAL INIATIVES IN AMHERST

AMHERST COUNTY ADULT DETENTION CENTER

- Program established in 2009.
- Horizon provides counseling services to inmates at the Amherst County Adult Detention Center on a weekly basis.
 - 100% of individuals connected with Horizon services in the jail are screened for eligibility and referred to appropriate services post-discharge.
- Upon release from jail, clients are offered transitional case management services and additional support to help them establish a residence, employment and other basic needs immediately following their release.
 - 95% of clients with identified needs are linked to post-release services prior to release from jail or detention.*


